- Keeping campsites clean around lakes by picking up trash and cleaning out fire pits. Trash bags will be provided and shovels for cleaning out fire pits.
- Checking trailhead permit boxes to collect permits and replenish box with more permits.
- Working on trails with mountain bike user groups.
- Working with a Forest Service trail crew on a project
- Being a trailhead host to inform users of any regulations in area, and be of general help to forest visitors.
- Adopting a lake to keep camp sites clean
- Doing Limits of Acceptable Change (LAC) surveys. These surveys are done on campsites in and out of wilderness areas. Training for completing these survey would be provided.
- Patrolling on weekends (at least two) during the summer to check campsites and trail conditions.
- Doing fishing surveys. This entails talking to fishermen and finding out where they are catching fish, how many, species and if they are having a good time! This survey will help the fish stocking program.
- Seeking out and identifying noxious weeds in wilderness areas
- Bringing in water samples from wilderness lakes.
